#### Musings from the Pews

On page 517 in our United Methodist Hymnal is *By Gracious Powers*, a wonderful text with which to start the new year. Or each day, for that matter. The poem is sometimes titled "New Year 1945." The author was German theologian Dietrich Bonhoeffer, and he wrote the poem while in a Gestapo prison; he had been arrested in April 1943. It was smuggled out in a letter to his mother dated December 28, 1944, and included in the volume of papers and letters first published in Germany in 1951 and in an English translation in 1953.

Our hymnal version was translated by Fred Pratt Green in 1972. What he uses as the first stanza is actually the last verse in the original poem. Bonhoeffer's first stanza reads: By faithful, quiet powers of good surrounded so wondrously consoled and sheltered here—I wish to live these days with you in spirit and with you enter into a new year. (*Letters and Papers from Prison*, Fortress Press, 1984).

Several years ago, I came across a painting by the artist/priest Sieger Köder. The painting is titled "Angels Are Carrying You" and depicts two large hands holding and protecting a number of children. For me, that is an illustration of being sheltered by gracious powers.

By gracious powers
so wonderfully sheltered,
and confidently waiting
come what may,
we know that God is with us
night and morning,
and never fails
to greet us each new day.

#### Now What?

In a rush to get our speaker out the door before a forecasted storm hit along his route home to western Michigan, the 10-month Institute for Congregational Development ended Dec 11. Now what, I wondered.

Standing in our denomination's Sun Prairie office, I thought there would be more than a closing prayer. Clouds parting? A light to follow? After all, just over a dozen people spent more time together than your average bowling team to learn from visionary speakers on growing some 20 churches they represented. (Only Pastor Jerry and Pastor Jerome of Green Bay each represented one church; all other pastors serve two or three local churches.)

On reflection, the lesson was that changes to grow are a slow, steady process.

After all, churches are institutions like any other. They can think they have a greater calling, yet every institution is powered by passionate people. In my mind, it's like my mother and I on our first-ever sailboat ride last summer: a series of little steps to change course so we not plunge into Lake Michigan.

This new year, we want more little steps as we continue our 2024 priority of expanding activities that can help us grow. Here's what ALB sees:

- > Projects/ministries must do at least two outreach activities. We need to get out of our bubbles to share our Good News (and good projects), whether that's at an AA meeting in our dining room or with the resident council at Lincoln Court Apartments. We cannot hide our message under a basket or among ourselves. Communication is power, invitational and personal.
- > Every leader must work with their team to identify and mentor the next leader. After all, Jesus mentored 12 people to continue God's work. We can mentor at least one to share the passion we feel for washing others' feet. To help, ALB members (who also need someone to replace them in managing our church) will serve as liaisons or resources in building skills and depth.
- > Projects/ministries must plan no less than 60 days before events. The leader must share basic information with our office for inclusion on the calendar and in communication. That basic info is: What (pancake supper); who to contact (Pam Karg); when and where (Shrove Tuesday, 4-6 pm, dining room); why (build community, feed hungry); and how (meal is free).

Let's continue creating disciples for Jesus who put love into action for all.

## Jo's Final Kids Christmas Program

Fifty years ago, Jo Bierer couldn't sleep the night before the first children's Christmas program she was directing.

"I was so nervous. I didn't know if I would make it," she recalled quietly to a few gathered around her during our monthly women's breakfast. "But this is going to be my last," Jo let slip.

We couldn't let the occasion slip by, though. At the end of the Sunday program during worship, Bierer was presented a small token of the congregation's appreciation for her years of dedicated service teaching our children about Jesus.

However, you're not going to believe the story behind this year's play, shared her daughter, Anna, after the Sunday performance. Just hours after that breakfast conversation, Jo and family members were in a car accident. "We didn't know if she was going to feel OK to make it today," Anna said after the Dec. 15 worship, which went off without any hitches and captured everyone's hearts.

Jo is stepping back from Sunday school and the children's Christmas program. She has mentored new teachers Hannah Brylow, Kelly Supataraporn and Katy Murphy for our children's ministries.

## Technology Upgrades Enhance Our Worship

Just before Christmas, technology failures were handled quickly, thanks to our Technology Team of Don Evans and Zachary Kitzman.

A new hand-held microphone replaced an older one. It matches one replaced earlier in 2024, thanks to an anonymous donation. The microphones are multi-directional, meaning our kids, for example, don't need to hold it right up to their mouths to be heard.

After the headset microphone broke, our Tech Team found two new ones so both worship leaders can use them hands-free.

The new equipment has been installed and was used during our Jan. 5 Epiphany worship.




